

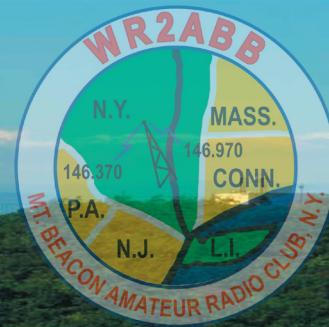

“Be Radioactive!”

If you are reading this article, I can assume you are licensed by the Federal Communication Commission, or have a really strong interest in HAM radio.

HAM radio is a hobby. Like other hobbies, you are HAM because it brings you some level of enjoyment, and rightfully so. HAM radio has many facets. In a broad sense, there are two main areas of HAM radio, communicating, and technology.

HAM radio is a technical hobby. We are operating sophisticated equipment. As a HAM you don't necessarily need to know everything about what under the keyboard, any more than a driver of a car needs to know everything under the hood or how about how the internal combustion engine works, but some knowledge is certainly helpful in getting the most out of your hobby.

As a HAM your area of enjoyment can range from passing your Technician test, plunking down \$150 for a HT, program in 146.970 MHz, negative offset, 100 Hz PL and getting on the repeater and talking to anyone and everyone. The other end of the spectrum, you study more, pass your Extra test, and design and launch a satellite. You may be so busy building and launching your satellite you almost never get on the air. Both are legitimate contributions to ham radio.

What I am trying to say here is, what ever your reason for being involved in HAM radio as a hobby, GET INTO IT! I am as guilty as the next guy of not participating as fully as I should sometimes.

If you are a “talker”, get on the repeater (or the HF bands) and talk. HAM radio needs activity.

I have my radio on scan in my car as I drive around (mostly during the day because of my work schedule) I hear very little activity on the Mt. Beacon repeaters. Other than net nights, I really don't hear all that much activity in the evening either. I can't remember the last time I had a QSO on the 449.575 MHz repeater. If you're a “talker”; fire that dual bander up on 70 cm.

If the technical aspect of HAM radio is more appealing WE NEED YOU! Try APRS, or Satellites, or Fast scan Amateur TV, or Slow scan ATV on the HF bands. If you don't have the time or money to get active with any of these technologies, get on the air and TALK about your interests. You will probably find others that are in to it or are interested in it and want to get into it.

If rag chewing is not your thing, and you are not technically inclined, public service events are fun, and a great use of time and equipment, and a good way to give back to the hobby.

If soldering surface mount components is not your thing, there is a whole wide world of antennas. I have been fascinated by some of the home brew antennas Frank, W2GIO has constructed. From UHF Yagis made out of heavy wire and wine corks to 6-meter loops, to his 2.4 GHz can antennas. The material expenses are low, the experimental aspects are high.

If you feel that all these technologies are above your head, there is always someone that would be pleased to be your “Elmer” and guide you on your “path to enlightenment”. The Engineering Committee is ALWAYS looking for more people to get involved in their projects. If you know nothing about repeater controllers or voters this year, you won't be able to say that 2 years from now, if you step forward and get involved.

In closing, if HAM radio is your hobby of choice, enjoy it, participate in it, give to HAM radio as you get from HAM radio.

APRS in the Hudson Valley

APRS (Automatic Position Reporting System) is a system for digital communications, most commonly used to automatically report the position (from a GPS) of a person, object or weather data. A mobile APRS station usually consists of a GPS, a TNC, and a 2 meter FM transceiver. A home station doesn't need the GPS since it is in a fixed location and will usually have a computer running an APRS software to display the location of the people, objects or weather data. APRS transmits and receives on a single frequency, 144.390 MHz. To widen the coverage of a mobile or home station digital repeaters (digipeaters) are used. These digipeaters are located in places that allow them to hear well and transmit over a wide area. Mount Beacon is such a location. To get local APRS data to APRS data websites, like findu.com and aprs.fi, Internet Gateway Stations (I-Gates) are set up. These stations listen to the APRS traffic and forward it to the internet. K1DF-6 at the Red Cross Chapter House in Poughkeepsie is an I-Gate. WA2YSM-3 and KB2ZE-3 are stations that can act as I-Gates in a backup situation.

Up until a few months ago APRS coverage in Dutchess and Ulster Counties was more or less limited to the central and southern parts of Dutchess County and to the South Eastern Part of Ulster County. There were two digipeaters, K1DF-15 on Mount Beacon and W2LW-15 in Poughquag. There were also two fill in digipeaters, WA2YSM-3 and KC2DAA-2 (at the Dutchess County EOC). Since then two additional digipeaters have become operational, NA2N-15 and WA2MJM-15.

NA2N-15 was set up by the ham volunteers at the Dutchess County Red Cross. It is located in Milan and provides pretty good coverage in northwestern Dutchess County and northeastern Ulster County.

WA2MJM-15 was set up by the Overlook Mountain ARC. It is located in Woodstock. It is currently operating but it's antenna isn't omnidirectional. An omnidirectional antenna and associated hardware have been purchased and are awaiting good weather for installation. It is hoped that it will provide coverage for the areas to the south of Woodstock.

There is a possibility that another digipeater might be added to better cover eastern Dutchess County, as well as another one to better cover northern Ulster County. Maybe for the next edition of the Repeater I'll be able to report on them.
